Comment on the authors' reaction

My goal was to initiate a technical debate among the BPM experts, declaredly without claiming to have a solution for the identified problem. van der Aalst and ter Hofstede, instead of putting forward arguments concerning the many technical problems I identified, essentially

- comment on the history of WPs including some generalities about systems whose study led them to the formulation of WPs
 - —this covers more than half of their reaction (Sect.2 and 5), not counting 1.5 pages for references and abstract/introduction where they dismiss my detailed technical criticism as making 'claims in a rather provocative and emotional manner' (a qualification which is in the eyes of the beholder; the reader is the judge)
- attribute to me ('Silver Bullett' and similar silly) claims I never made
- try to denigrate the Abstract State Machines Method, although in the evaluation it plays no role and in fact is not discussed there
- invoke citation counts as quality argument
